

Fifth Sunday in Lent

March 17th, 2024



Welcome to St Laurence's this morning, the fifth Sunday of Lent. Today sees the beginning of Passiontide: our thoughts turn from Jesus' life and ministry towards his final journey to Jerusalem, and then his death and resurrection.

Today, Jesus reminds us that unless a seed die, it cannot produce a rich harvest – an insight that lies at the very heart of our Christian life. And so, like Jeremiah in today's first reading, we pray that God will inscribe this command to give ourselves to the service of love deep in our hearts.

We regret that the promised speaker from the Children's Society is unable to be with us today, but we are very fortunate to have Hannah, from a different young persons' charity, Action of Conservation, instead. She will talk about the work of this most important charity after the service in the church hall. And our preacher this morning will be Grace Blyth, who is our Children's Society parish rep

Before the service begins...

- Please do not talk to each other before mass. Talk to God before mass, and to each other afterwards. From about 9.45am we hope to have silence in church except for only the most necessary communication. (Many of us complain we never hear God speaking to us: do we give him a chance to do so?) In the silence, there is a chance to read through the lessons and to prepare for mass: in particular, to think about the things we are sorry for, have come to give God thanks for, to pray for...
- Please *do* talk to each other after mass. *Please* do not rush off without a word to anyone. Why not come through to the church hall for coffee especially if you do not normally do so and make a point of talking to people you do not know?
- During Lent, we are giving up the organ to accompany our singing. Please sing as best you can to the glory of God! After all, God created *your* voice to be used in his praise and worship. We are blessed with a resonant church, and every voice makes a difference.
- The readings for this service can be found in the centrefold of this booklet.

At the beginning of the service, please keep silence. As the clergy and servers enter church, the choir sing the entrance antiphon: Give me justice, O God, and plead my cause against a nation that is faithless. From the deceitful and cunning rescue me, for you, O God, are my strength.

We sing the first hymn

LEAD us, heavenly Father, lead us o'er the world's tempestuous sea; guard us, guide us, keep us, feed us for we have no help but thee; yet possessing every blessing if our God our Father be.

Saviour! breathe forgiveness o'er us, all our weakness thou dost know, thou didst tread this earth before us, thou didst feel its keenest woe; lone and dreary, faint and weary, through the desert thou didst go.

Spirit of our God, descending, fill our hearts with heavenly joy, love with every passion blending, pleasure that can never cloy; thus provided, pardoned, guided, nothing can our peace destroy! (339)

In the name of the ♣ Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit:

ALL: Amen

The Lord be with you: and also with you.

The priest welcomes everyone to St Laurence's and introduces the theme of the service.

We are invited to call to mind whatever we have done wrong in the sight of God.

We keep silence.



You plead for us at the right hand of the Father:



May almighty God have mercy upon you forgive you your sins and bring you to eternal life.

Amen

During Lent, we omit the Gloria.


Please remain standing while the priest prays the opening prayer:

By your help, we beeseech you, Lord our God, may we walk eagerly in that same charity with which, out of love for the world, your Son handed himself over to death, through our Lord Jesus Christ, your Son, who lives and reigns with you in the unity of the Holy Spirit God, for ever, and ever

Amen

Then everyone sits to listen to the Old Testament reading (the readings are printed out in the Centrefold of this booklet)

Psalm 51: 1,2,10-13 (Miserere Mei, Deus)

THE OFFERTORY

Gifts of bread and wine are placed on the altar. There is no collection at this point in the service. Please leave your offering in the box as you leave church (if you have not done so).

We stand to sing the offertory hymn:

Who is this, so weak and helpless, child of lowly Hebrew maid, rudely in a stable sheltered, coldly in a manger laid?
'Tis the Lord of all creation, who this wondrous path has trod; he is God from everlasting, and to everlasting God.

Who is this – a Man of Sorrows, walking sadly life's hard way, homeless, weary, sighing, weeping over sin and Satan's sway? 'Tis our God, our glorious Saviour, who above the starry sky now for us a place prepareth, where no tear can dim the eye.

and looking for his coming in glory, we celebrate this memorial of our redemption.


As we offer you this our sacrifice of praise & thanksgiving, we bring before you this bread and this cup and we thank you for counting us worthy to stand in your presence and serve you

who takes away the sins of the world.

Blessed are those who are called to his supper.

Lord, I am not worthy to receive you, but only say the word and I shall be healed.

The priest will say to all: The body of Christ and everyone who intends to receive communion replies together: *Amen*.

All who are prepared and are accustomed to receiving holy communion are invited to join with us this morning. Please follow the guidance of the churchwardens, who will invite you to the front of the church to receive if you wish.

Please receive the host standing, and allow the priest to drop the wafer into your hand. If you wish to share in the chalice, please move over to a chalice bearer to the left or right of the priest. If you would like a blessing instead, please bow your head.

Communion Anthem:

Ave, Ave verum corpus natum ex Maria Virgine, vere passum, immolatum in cruce pro homine.

Cuius latus perforatum unda fluxit et sanguine esto nobis proegustatum in mortis examine.

(Hail, true body, born of the Virgin Mary, which truly suffered, crucified for humankind; from whose wounded side water and blood flowed; be our nourishment in the trials of death.)

After this prayer, please be seated for the Church notices, then stand for God's blessing Go in the peace of Christ: Thanks be to God.

Everyone sings the last hymn as the clergy, choir and servers leave the church.

Easter Day:

8am mass of the dawn 10am: Festive Eucharist
